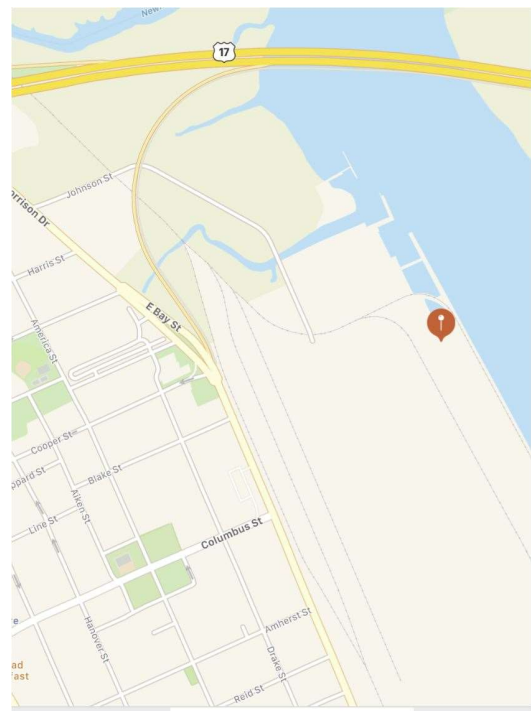
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Statement of Purpose

The mission of the Interior Design Certificate Program is designed to partner with each student through course study, practical application and personal coaching to build the knowledge, confidence and marketable skills for the interior design professional.

Facilities

Charleston School of Interior Design will meet at 49 Immigration Street, downtown Charleston. Our space is equipped with a classroom for instruction, with a male and female lavatory. There is parking available in front of the building. This is an ADA accessible facility. The maximum class size is 16 and the student/teacher ratio is 8 to 1. Classes are taught via lecture, Power Point, and student hands on projects.



School Calendar, Class Schedules, and Program Starting Dates

The design program is designed to start students in August of a calendar year and have the required courses completed by July of the following calendar year. A completed official enrollment agreement must be submitted to the Charleston School of Interior Design prior to the start of the course.

Calendar

Holidays: The following holidays will be observed and classes will not be held. New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Holidays are not counted as part of the contracted time schedule.

Add/Drop Dates: Students may register up to twelve hours before a course starts. A student has seventy-two hours to drop a course from the time of enrollment for a full refund.

Total hours for each course vary based on the curriculum. Business hours are Monday – Friday 9:00 AM until 4:00 PM

Classes are scheduled in the evenings to accommodate working professionals and full day-time students.

Admission & Entrance Requirements

Students interested in design courses must be currently enrolled in high school as at least a junior or have graduated with a High School Diploma or General Education Development (GED) Diploma.

Application Procedures: Students wishing to enroll in a course at Charleston School of Interior Design must submit an official enrollment agreement either electronically or through the mail. A written response accepting the student into the program will be sent electronically within forty-eight hours of receipt of his/her enrollment agreement.

Certificate of Completion

Each student completing a course will receive a course certificate from Charleston School of Interior Design. Once all nine courses in the program are completed an overall certificate will be issued from Charleston School of Interior Design.

Completing the program at Charleston School of Interior Design does not guarantee employment. Our courses will not transfer to any other institution. Charleston School of Interior Design does not offer job placement assistance.

Pursuant under Title 8 US Code Section 1621 Citizenship, Authorized Alien, Immigrant status is now a prerequisite for a professional license by any agency or state or local government.

Criminal activity may affect obtaining employment.

Joining a professional organization or the interior design business will be the responsibility of the student. Charleston School of Interior Design does not provide job placement assistance.

Tuition

168 hours completes the design program. Tuition is paid on a per course basis for a total tuition of \$3,255.00 (See tuition paragraph below.) See course catalog for individual course tuition. If classes are taken in a consecutive basis program could be completed in 52 weeks (which includes holidays and breaks). However, completion may take longer depending on student's availability.

Credit for previous education will be granted on a per case basis. Charleston School of Interior Design will review each case and send approval in writing.

Textbooks will be the responsibility of the student to purchase prior to the second class meeting of each course.

Supplies & equipment are purchased by each individual on an as-need basis. Computer usage for the program will be student owned and supplied. Charleston School of Interior Design is not responsible for the personal device usage. Misuse of information systems is prohibited.

Program Tuition: \$3,255.00 per student. Payment plan: \$295.00 or \$395.00 due 72 hours prior to each of the nine course start dates.

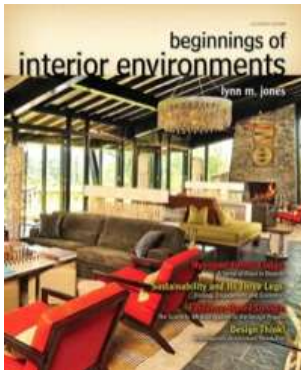

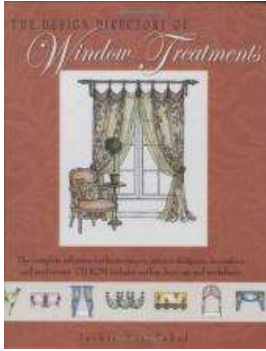

Financial Aid Assistance

Charleston School of Interior Design does not currently offer any financial assistance. Students will need to meet all financial and academic requirements before a Certificate of Completion will be issued.

Grading System / Standards for Progress

Grades and Assessment reports will be provided to the students midway through each course and will always be available through individual conferences with the instructor at any time. Project based classes will be graded on a Pass or Fail scale based on the program criteria met using the Fair, Good or Excellent grading scale. Fair – did not

complete work, Good – met minimum requirements but missing items and Excellent – having followed all directions and included all requirements in the completed project. All student records will be maintained for fifty (50) years.

Students completing each course successfully will receive an individual course certificate. Students who complete all decorating course hours offered will receive an overall Certificate of Completion. See section on Certificates.

Incomplete Grades & Make Up Work

It is the student's responsibility to make up any missed assignments, quizzes or tests. A fail grade will be issued if missed assignments, quizzes or tests are not completed within two weeks. A student missing project presentation must contact the instructor within twenty-four hours of the presentation deadline to arrange for a make-up date. Failure to do so will result in an incomplete for the course subject and no certificate will be issued.

Attendance Requirements

Charleston School of Interior Design asks that students do not miss more than two classes per course. If for some reason a student misses more than the allowable excused absences he or she will have his or her case reviewed by the school administrator with the likelihood of being dropped from the program.

Tardiness

Charleston School of Interior Design wants each student to develop a good work ethic as part of the training. Students arriving late to class interrupt the instructor as well as other students. The school asks that you make every effort to be early or on time to class.

Cancellation & Refund Policy

Students wishing to withdraw from the program must submit a written notification to the owner. Depending on the time frame in which a student withdraws will determine the refund of tuition. Withdraw Policy:

- An applicant may cancel this agreement without penalty by notifying the school within three business days after signing the enrollment agreement.
- After the third day but before class begins, the school will retain \$100.00.
- For students who enroll in the full Interior Design program, after classes begin, for the first sixty percent of the course Charleston School of Interior Design will retain \$100 plus the prorated tuition charge based on the last date attended.
- Two weeks into the course the tuition will be refunded all but 30% (minus the administration fee of \$100.00). After four weeks or more the tuition will not be refunded for the course enrolled.
- Charleston School of Interior Design will make refunds within forty days after the effective date of cancellation or the last day attended.

School Cancellation: This program requires a minimum of five (5) participants. Students will be notified in writing electronically if a start date is rescheduled or if the course is cancelled. If due to a lack of participants, the school administrators will cancel the course and issue a full refund within 40 days of the scheduled start date to all enrolled.

Consumer Complaints

Any person having a complaint or grievance against Charleston School of Interior Design should make a reasonable effort to obtain satisfaction from Charleston School of Interior Design by submitting a written complaint to the School Administrators. Charleston School of Interior Design requires that a written statement including name, dates and any other pertinent information regarding the objection. Charleston School of Interior Design will respond in a timely manner in hopes that the complaint would be resolved amicably. However, in the event that a resolution cannot be reached, the person may file a written complaint with the SC Commission on Higher Education. The complaint should include all evidence bearing on the issues and documentation that a reasonable effort was made to first resolve the complaint directly with Charleston School of Interior Design.

Conditions for Dismissal

If the student does not adhere to the guidelines outlined in this handbook the school reserves the right to dismiss him or her. The school owner will notify the student in writing should it become necessary to dismiss the student. The letter will be dated with an explanation for the reason of dismissal. Prepaid tuition will be refunded according to the school's refund policy. Charleston School of Interior Design will reconsider a student to re-enter the program after a probation period of sixty days. Students wishing to re-enroll will need to submit a written request which will be reviewed by school administrators.

- Demonstrate knowledge of the interior decorating process from conceptual development, presentation and execution of the project.
- Apply critical thinking skills necessary for problem solving through creative solutions for the interior spaces.
- Produce technical drawings with detailed specifications for design planning.
- Present professional material presentation boards for client projects.
- Apply resourceful knowledge in planning and designing a residential space.
- Hold the technical knowledge and skill for entry level employment opportunities within the field of interior design and related construction industry.
